**Detox USA** 

Detox USA is conceived as a thesis studio. Within the rubric of the course, students undertake their own research, formulate their own design project, and work individually. However, partnering is also possible and permitted and depending on the composition of the class this year may be preferable. We will discuss these options in the first week of studio.

#### USA

Like clouds of pollutants or narcotic exhaust, toxicity is not easily contained. It wafts, floats, seeps, and oozes. It is also exported along with military technologies to conflict zones, it travels as pharmaceutical products, and it migrates as petrochemical practices and techniques. Contemporary markets, trade routes, sites of resource extraction, and scenes of geopolitical tensions are its arteries, agents, and accumulators.

The area within the boundaries of the United States is the nominal site and starting point for the studio. Yet the USA will also be understood as the center of an expanded chemical field of toxic effects, products, buproducts, and accumulations. ### LA's Four (or Forty) Toxic Ecologies

Since the first national American symposium on air pollution held in 1949 in Pasadena, Los Angeles has been ground zero for seeing and testing the relation between cities and different pollutants, contaminants, and processes of purification, from smog controls to addiction therapy. The studio will travel to Los Angeles and the surrounding region to encounter this history, to view the architectures of containment and exposure, and to reflect on the different sites and forms of cultural and chemical concentration. While there, we will meet with a range of experts from atmospheric scientists, to artists, architects, curators, and therapists. To be clear, no student is required to work on Los Angeles. Rather, by expanding on Banham's four ecologies, Los Angeles will serve as a spatial primer for our understanding of the histories and processes of chemical modernity.

#### Time for a Reset.

In the past year and a half, the entangled crises of a global Architecture pandemic, climate change, racial injustice, and income Environmental justice inequality have demonstrated that current systems fail to Civilian climate corps adequately address the challenges of these times. And a gradual transformation will not be enough.

Same with our architecture. Our current systems of design and construction are failing. They cannnot adequarely address clmate change, public health, and inequality - especially at the intersection of population growth, urbanization, and the expexted doubling of the built environment in the next 40 years. The challenges are huge, and incremental change is not the answer.

This studio explored these entanglements and intersections through radical imagination and scalable impact. It looked for opportunities like the unprecedented \$3.5 trillion infrastructure plan currently being debated in the United States and the historic United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP26). It developed strategies such as materials that act as a carbon sink, buildings that are open systems, and an empowered workforce through a Civilian Climate Corps. This studio sought to prototype the buildings and cities of the future.






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

This last year of social may have belonged to. uprisings in response to the murder of George Floyd and other Black americans has revealed the defecits in awareness and ability for architecture to address issues of systemic racism in the discipline. When it comes to issues of social justice architecture has a long road ahead of it.

This studio builds off the ideas, and practices of BIPOC thinkers and activists to work towards a decolonization of the inherited legacies of settler colonialism in the discipline of architecture. Working in contexts and communities, especially indigenous communities, that are not your own, requires that we situate ourselves within the larger historical processes of colonialism that have shaped the world through the oppression of indigneous people and people of color. If we can understand our personal position in and orientation to colonialism within a larger continuum of history, we may be able to understand how the past has shaped our individual world views (politically, culturally, lives? emotionally, and spiritually), how our bodies are at home in certain spaces and not others, and as a result how we conceive of and practice architecture.

This exercise suggests that as much as we may think of ourselves as individuals, we cannot separate ourselves from the complex web of relationships that we inherit from our ancestors and the identity groups that they

Sessions will include case-study review and discussion, critical analysis of design and design-technology strategies, and overall exposure to diverse approaches to industry design practices. Guest lecturers will introduce industryproven examples of platform integrations, and demonstrate methodologies for students to consider for their own design problem. The guest lectures will each take a different lens of informed design interventions and interoperability, including computational and iterative design, advanced interoperability for design optimization, performance-based strategies to address energy and environmental design considerations, and cloud-BIM strategies to iterate at the detail level of building articulation.
