1. Look closely at Tschabalala Self's mixed-media painting Vanity.

- 2. What do you notice? Discuss with a partner: What stands out to you? What do you think the figure in red is doing? What do you think about the dark shape below the figure in red? Is it a shadow or another figure? Describe the emotions the figure' poses and colors might suggest.
- **3. Reflect:** Why do you think Self named the work Vanity? What stories do you imagine unfolding between the figures?

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Tschabalala (pronounced sha-ba-la-la) Self was born in 1990 in Harlem, New York. She now lives in New Haven, Connecticut. Self creates paintings or "assemblages," where she combines a variety of paints and fabric. She stitches the fabric into the canvas with a sewing machine and creates imagined figures and scenes. Self 's work explores ideas of everyday life, the Black female body, and humanity.

Suggested Materials: Paper, pencil, markers, magazine, colored paper, fabric-use what you have available!



Movement + Drawing Project:

- **1.** Get up and move! Think about different shapes you can make with your body. Choose three poses that express who you are.
- **2.** Teach a partner your poses. Then have them model your poses while you draw them!
- **3.** Add to your drawing with materials such as magazine cut-outs and multicolored paper that further express and visually illustrate who you are in these poses.
- 4. Share your drawing with a friend or family member!

Vanity explores how bodies are affected by race and gender. Through paint and stitched fabric, this work and many of her other bodies of work, is assembled in a collage style. Her artmaking process reflects the idea that we are made up of fragments of memories and identities. In Self's own words, "You are the sum of your experiences, but you also absorb... all of the different ideas and experiences of others. My process mimics this phenomenon."
