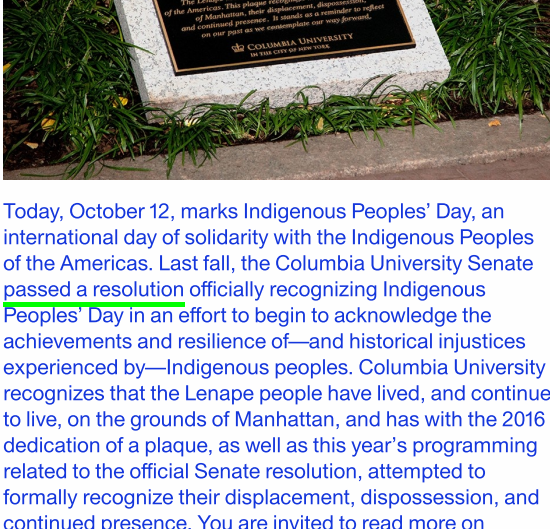


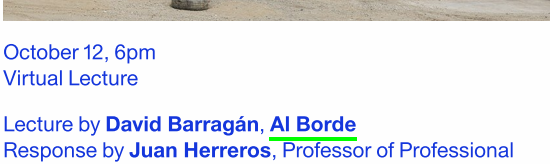
OCTOBER 12 – 16



Today, October 12, marks Indigenous Peoples' Day, an international day of solidarity with the Indigenous Peoples of the Americas. Last fall, the Columbia University Senate passed a resolution officially recognizing Indigenous Peoples' Day in an effort to begin to acknowledge the achievements and resilience of—and historical injustices experienced by—Indigenous peoples. Columbia University recognizes that the Lenape people have lived, and continue to live, on the grounds of Manhattan, and has with the 2016 dedication of a plaque, as well as this year's programming related to the official Senate resolution, attempted to formally recognize their displacement, dispossession, and continued presence. ## HYBRID ACTIVISM

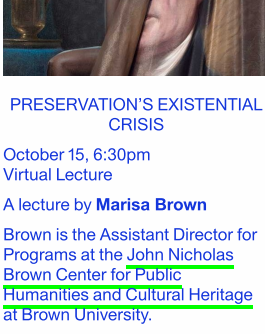

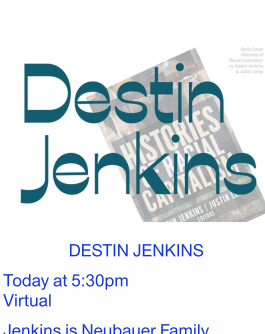
## DAN TAEYOUNG AND JIA ZHANG

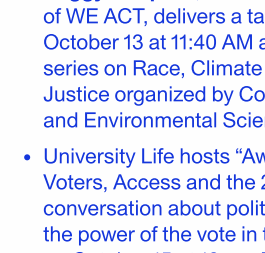

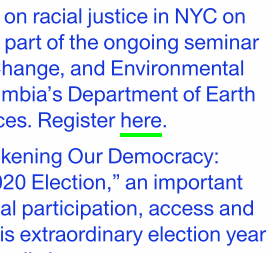
## DESTIN JENKINS
