Today, October 12, marks Indigenous Peoples' Day, an international day of solidarity with the Indigenous Peoples of the Americas. Last fall, the Columbia University Senate passed a resolution officially recognizing Indigenous Peoples' Day in an effort to begin to acknowledge the achievements and resilience of-and historical injustices experienced by-Indigenous peoples. Columbia University recognizes that the Lenape people have lived, and continue to live, on the grounds of Manhattan, and has with the 2016 dedication of a plaque, as well as this year's programming related to the official Senate resolution, attempted to formally recognize their displacement, dispossession, and continued presence.
