Born October 1915

This week, you're invited to learn more about Beverly L. Greene ('45 MArch, 1915-57), the first African American woman licensed to practice architecture in the United States, and Norma Merrick Sklarek ('50 BArch, 1926-2012), the first African American woman to be made a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects. Listen to Roberta Washington ('71 MArch) and Patricia Morton ('83 MArch) speak about their lives and work during GSAPP's recent New Research in Black Women's History in Architecture discussion hosted by Professor Mary McLeod.

"Merrick Sklarek's and Greene's careers unfolded at a time when the field of architecture was predominantly white an d male. Although female representation has since increased, the fact that only 0.4% of registered architects in the U.S. are Black women, according to the 2020 National Council of Architectural Registration Boards, is a poignant reminder of how this disparity persists." 
