LECTURE IN PLANNING SERIES





Frederick Wherry, Debt Collection, Relational Damages, and the Infrastructure for Repair, October 13, 2020.

Professor Wherry draws upon his work to demonstrate the range of damages wrought by debt collection practices. He turned to the lack of infrastructure for justice and described how his new Debt Collection Lab is beginning to build new infrastructure to track and analyze the injustices of debt collection.
