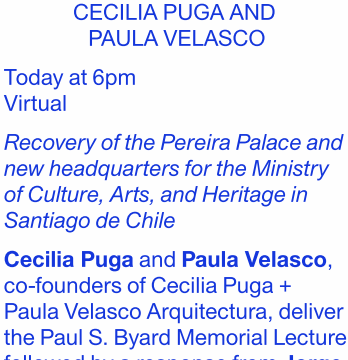

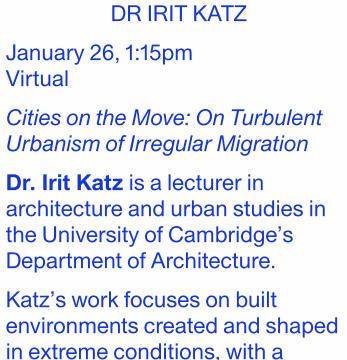

Cecilia Puga and **Paula Velasco**, co-founders of Cecilia Puga + Paula Velasco Arquitectura, deliver the Paul S. Byard Memorial Lecture followed by a response from **Jorge Otero-Pailos**, Professor and Director of the Historic Preservation Program.

The Pereira Palace is the result of a 2012 international public competition. The project includes the restoration of a mid-19th century building and a new office building for Chile’s Ministry of Culture, Arts, and Heritage.

Cities on the Move: On Turbulent Urbanism of Irregular Migration

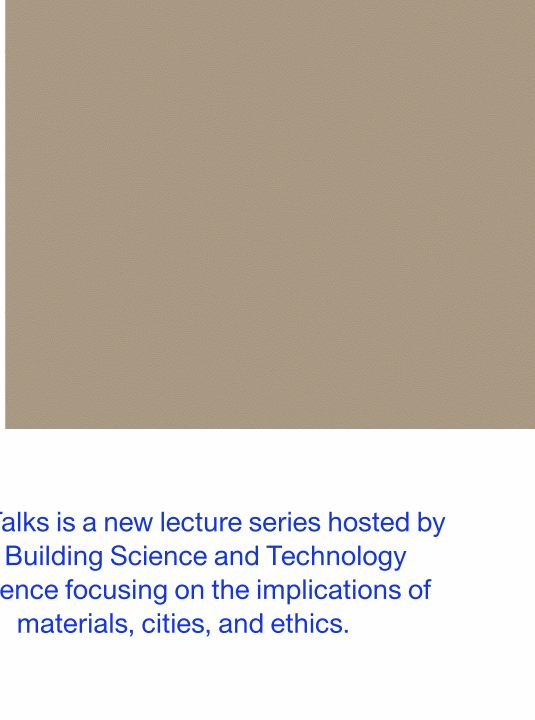
Dr. Irit Katz is a lecturer in architecture and urban studies in the University of Cambridge’s Department of Architecture.

Katz’s work focuses on built environments created and shaped in extreme conditions, with a particular emphasis on spaces of displacement, migration, and refuge in camps and in cities. She co-edited *Camps Revisited: Multifaceted Spatialities of a Modern Political Technology* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2018); her monograph *The Common Camp: Spaces of Power and Resistance in Israel-Palestine* is forthcoming.

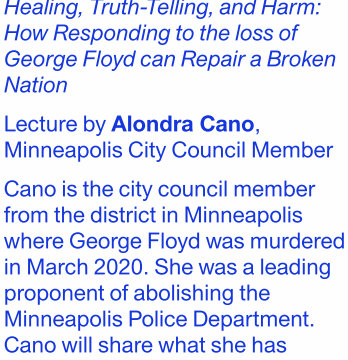
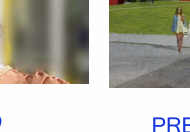


Tech Talks is a new lecture series hosted by the Building Science and Technology Sequence focusing on the implications of materials, cities, and ethics.

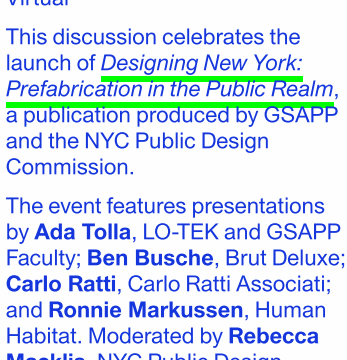

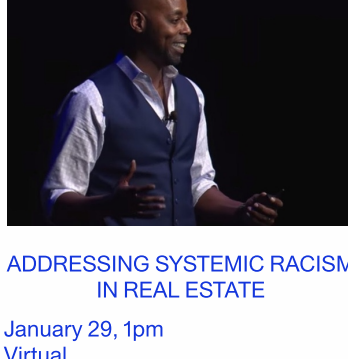


PREFABRICATION IN THE PUBLIC REALM

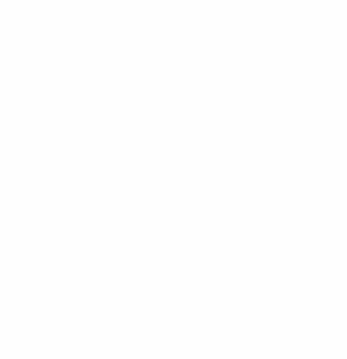
