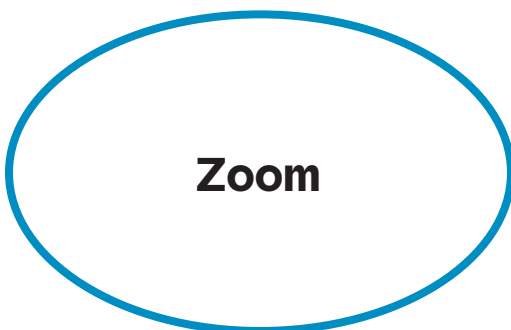


About the artist

Ryan Gander is an artist who playfully and thoughtfully creates paintings, sculptures, films, photographs, and installations. He often places familiar and unfamiliar objects together, which makes us think about how we experience them.

He was born in 1976, in Chester, England, and currently lives and works in London and Suffolk, England.

Ryan Gander made a calendar that includes notes, images, and photographs from his notebooks.


In the space below, write the date today and make your own design for today's calendar.

Ryan's four-year-old daughter likes to make forts! He makes a mold of her creations and then pours marble resin into the mold to create a sturdy, hard object.

Ask

Now, let's go into Gallery 4 and find *Magnus Opus*.

Ask someone with you these questions:

What is this artwork doing?

What do these eyes see?

How do they make you feel?

Why do you think the artist made this?

Take Home In Gallery 5, find sculptures with the title *A lamp made by the artist for his wife*.

In response to a request from his wife for a new lamp, the artist regularly makes lamps from unexpected, found objects.
