Like Sugar explores seduction, destructive power of substance February 9 to June 9, 2019

SARATOGA SPRINGS, NY (December 18, 2018) — Our taste for sweetness is a powerful force. It is one of the foundations of empires; of slavery; of ecological devastation; and of modern health epidemics and food injustice. Even knowing this, we love it. Sugar changes shape and form with ease. Flowers and fruits seduce birds, insects, and other creatures with their nectars; for human beings, sugar starts as cane, beets, or corn, and people have harvested and manipulated and packaged it to suit consumers' fancies.

The Frances Young Tang Teaching Museum and Art Gallery at Skidmore College presents

a new exhibition, *Like Sugar*, which runs from February 9 through June 9, 2019, and explores the problematic and the joyful aspects of sugar, complicating our view of how this multi-layered substance affects us.

Visitors will encounter mid-century advertisements for candy, sugar and soda; tools used in the cutting and processing of sugar cane; historical stereoscopic images of workers in sugar-cane fields; and artwork by contemporary artists such as Maria Magdalene Campos-Pons, Will Cotton, Tim Davis, Julia Jacquette, Beatriz Milhazes, Vik Muniz, Zineb Sedira, Laurie Simmons, Kara Walker and others. The exhibition will raise questions and provide a space for dialogue about sugar in our lives.

Events include a March 4 panel discussion on Food Futures: Food Justice, Sustainability, and Well-Being, moderated by Tang Curator-at-Large Isolde Brielmaier and featuring Anthony Hatch, author of *Blood Sugar: Racial Pharmacology and Food Justice in Black America*, and Leah

Penniman, an educator, farmer, writer, and food justice activist from Soul Fire Farm in Grafton, New York; and a March 26 brown bag lunch with food-blogger, culinary historian, and author Michael Twitty, whose book *The Cooking Gene*, won the 2018 James Beard Foundation Book Award for Book of the Year as well as the category for writing.
