



The house functioned in part as a design laboratory and studio for Miss Meredith, so its appearance evolved subtly over the years, reflecting Miss Meredith's studies of color and material." The home was shared with her partner Dr. Edna

Meade Colson, who served as dean of the Virginia State University School of Education. Meredith is also known for establishing the development Azurest North together with her sister Maude Terry in Sag Harbor, New York during the 1940s. The historically Black beach community was recently listed on the NY State and National Registers of Historic Places.


