past





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

I liked to sit on the fire escape and watch the silhouettes of the dancers through the curtains of the Savoy. We could hardly wait for the music of the big bands to start. We could listen to the greatest orchestras in the world from our living room. And every time I got a chance, I'd dance. I loved to dance. I felt born to be a dancer. I'd make up dance routines and call out to my mother, "Look at me! Look at me!" I'd shimmy and turn a fast two-step, imitating the dancers I saw. Dancing was in my blood.

**TWIST MOUTH'S NEW SITE**

On Sundays after church, I was part of a group of kids who ran over to the Savoy just as the music was going to start. There was a four o'clock matinee, and the music just seemed to swing out onto the street. I loved to "cut up," dancing the Charleston on the sidewalk for tips and "eyeballing" the people as they passed by. Sometimes we had Charleston contests on the street, and people threw money at me. I'd make some pennies, a nickel, a dime, sometimes twenty-five cents. That was a lot of money.

Every week when Twist Mouth George arrived, everyone crowded around him. Twist Mouth was the best. He had added a new step to our way of dancing just about the time Charles Lindbergh left New York on the first solo flight






Illustration demonstrating dances popularized at the Savoy.  
Opposite: Savoy Reservation Guide including floor plan, gentle reminders, menu, and autograph card.






I've begun making a quilt

train exactly.)


The old train cars are

met in all those years ago.


