The 2025 Highvern Spring Pickleball League Rules

The following rules are a quick overview of how the game is played. There are rule modifications made to meet the recreational nature of the Jersey Pickleball league. All other rules will be governed by the England Pickleball Association. Jersey Pickleball has the right to modify the league rules for the betterment of the league.

Doubles and single league consisting of men's, women's and mixed couples. Teams consist of 4 players on the court for doubles and 2 players for singles. The Spring League will run between 9 to 12 weeks, entry fee is £10 p/p or £20 per team made payable via Revolut ([revolut.me/thomasjpnv](https://www.revolut.me/thomasjpnv)), cash or bank transfer (Acc 00237894 sort code 83-21-27). Doubles Teams will pay for the cost of court at £3 each or £6 for singles Please pay for court hire at the reception kiosk or online at https://stclementstennis.mycourts.co.uk/payplay_bookings.asp?d=1

GENERAL GAME INFORMATION

Players will spin the paddle or play a rally to determine who will serve first. The winner of the spin or rally will have the option to choose court side or to serve or receive. If the winner chooses to serve or receive, the loser picks the starting court side. If the winner chooses the starting court side, the loser chooses to serve or receive.

Doubles Teams play best of five games or the first team to win 3 games. The number of games played each date depends on the number of teams signed up for the league. The first side scoring 11 points (Point per serve) and leading by at least a two-point margin wins. If both sides are tied at 10 points, then golden point (sudden death) applies. Each match won the winners will receive 3 points 1 point for a draw, Important please note 5 bonus points will be awarded to teams that play all their matches in the league.

Singles, play best of three games or the first player to win 2 games. The first player scoring 21 points (Point per rally) and leading by at least a two-point margin wins. When a player reaches 20 points, they can only win the next points when they are serving (Point per serve). If both players are on 20 points each, they must win by 2 clear points and only on point when serving. Each match won the winners will receive 3 points 1 point for a draw, Important please note 5 bonus points will be awarded to players that play all their matches in the league.

Doubles, at the beginning of each new game, only one partner on the serving team has the opportunity to serve before faulting, after which the service passes to the receiving team. After that, each team member serves until that player loses the serve when the team commits a fault. After both players have lost their serves, the serve passes to the opposing team.

Singles at the beginning of each new game whoever wins the serve will start on the right-hand side (even Side). Please note If the score is odd the player serving has to serve from the left-hand side (n odd Side)

Points are scored only by the serving team for doubles and for singles it is a point per rally. A fault is any action that stops play because of a rule violation. If a team/single is unable to find a substitute player or turn up for a match, the team/player will forfeit that dates scheduled game(s) that have been arranged by both parties.

GAME PLAY

- • The game ball will be the yellow balls provided at the reception Kiosk or players can use their own ball but it must be a yellow Head 40 outdoor ball. Players that do not have their own paddles can hire one from the Golf reception kiosk.
- • Teams are responsible for recording their score (on-site) following each game and then whatsapp (07797758834) or emailing (jerseypickleball@gmail.com) to the League Administrator.
- It is not mandatory that teams/singles play on the scheduled time and date if a team cannot make the scheduled time and date, they must reschedule with the other team an alternative time and day before the next scheduled match.
- • If the sun is an interference for one team/singles, teams/singles may switch sides once one team/singles has reached six points for doubles and 12 for singles.

SERVICE SEQUENCE

- • At the beginning of each new game, only one partner on the serving team has the opportunity to serve before faulting, after which the service passes to the receiving team. After that, each team member serves until that player loses the serve when the team commits a fault. After both players have lost their serves, the serve passes to the opposing team.
- • The first serve of each side out is made from the right-hand court. Side out is declared after one side loses its service and other side is awarded service, please use the odd and even format when serving. (Singles always serve from the left hand side when the score is odd) (Please not this is not the combined score but just the servers score)
- • If a point is scored, the server switches sides and the server initiates the next serve from the left-hand court.
- • As subsequent points are scored, the server continues switching back and forth until a fault is committed and the first server loses the serve.

- • When the first server loses the serve, the partner then serves from their correct side of the court. The second server continues serving until his team commits a fault and loses the serve to the opposing team.
- • Once the service goes to the opposition (at side out), the first serve is from the right-hand court and both players on that team have the opportunity to serve and score points until their team commits two faults.

SERVE

- • The serve must be underhand or dropped no pre spin before ball is struck on the serve.
- • Paddle contact with the ball must be below the server's waist (navel level) unless it's a drop serve.
- • The serve is initiated with at least one foot behind the baseline; neither foot may contact the baseline or court until after the ball is struck.
- • The serve is made diagonally crosscourt and must land within the confines of the opposite diagonal court.
- • Only one serve attempt is allowed, there is no let in Doubles pickleball when a serve hits the net but lands properly in your opponent's side of the court beyond the no-volley zone line, it is a live ball and played off the net without stopping play. If the serve hits the net and doesn't make it over or beyond the kitchen line, it is a loss of serve for the serving team.
- • Serves shall not be made until the receiver is ready and the score has been called. Serving before the score is called shall result in a fault, and loss of serve.
- • If a ball from another court interferes with your game, you may call it and re-do the serve.

DOUBLE BOUNCE RULE

- • When the ball is served, the receiving team must let it bounce before returning, and then the serving team must let it bounce before returning, thus two bounces.
- • After the ball has bounced once in each team's court, both teams may either volley the ball (hit the ball before it bounces) or play it off a bounce (ground stroke).

SCORING

- • Points are scored only by the serving team for doubles and point per rally for singles.
- • The score should be called as three numbers. The proper sequence for calling the score is: Server Score—Receiver Score—Server one or two. To start a game, the score will be called: Zero—Zero—Start.
- • The team's points will be even when the game's starting server is on the right-hand side. Points will be odd when the game's starting server is on the left-hand side.

LINE CALLS

- • A ball contacting any line, except the non-volley zone line on a serve, is considered "in."
- • A serve contacting the non-volley zone line is short and a fault.
- • A ball contacting the playing surface outside of the baseline or side-line, even though the edge of the ball overlaps the line, is considered out of bounds if there are official line judges present.
- • Players will call the lines on their side of the court.

- • No player should question an opponent's call unless asked. A player should ask the opponent's opinion if the opponent was in a better position to see the call. An opponent's opinion, if requested, shall be accepted. The opinion of a player looking down the line is more likely to be accurate than one looking across the line. If both teams or players are unsure, please play a let and replay the point.

NON-VOLLEY ZONE (COMMONLY REFERRED TO AS "THE KITCHEN")

- • The non-volley zone is the court area within seven feet on both sides of the net.
- • Volleying is prohibited within the non-volley zone. This rule prevents players from executing smashes from a position within the zone.
- • It is a fault if, when volleying a ball, the player steps on the non-volley zone, including the line and/or when the player's momentum causes them to touch the non-volley zone including the associated lines.
- • It is a fault if, after volleying, a player is carried by momentum into or touches the non-volley zone, even if the volleyed ball is declared dead before this happens.
- • A player may legally be in the non-volley zone any time other than when volleying a ball.
- • A player may enter the non-volley zone before or after returning any ball that bounces.
- • If a player has touched the non-volley zone for any reason, that player cannot volley the return until both feet have made contact with the playing surface completely outside the non-volley zone.
- • The act of volleying the ball includes the swing, the follow-through, and the momentum from the action. If the paddle touches the non-volley zone during the swing, it is a fault regardless of whether the touch occurred before or after contacting the ball.
- • Non-volley zone faults may be called by any player on either team.

FAULTS

- • A fault is any action that stops play because of a rule violation.
- • A fault by the receiving team results in a point for the serving team.
- • A fault by the serving team results in the server's loss of serve or side out.
- • A player must have possession of the paddle when it makes contact with the ball.
- • A fault occurs when:
 - A serve does not land within the confines of the receiving court.
 - The ball is hit into the net on the serve or any return.
 - The ball is volleyed before a bounce has occurred on each side.
 - The ball is hit out of bounds.
 - A ball is volleyed from the non-volley zone.
 - A ball bounces twice before being struck by the receiver.
 - A player, player's clothing, or any part of a player's paddle touches the net or the net post when the ball is in play.
 - There is a violation of a service and/or non-volley zone rule.
 - A ball in play strikes a player or anything the player is wearing or carrying.

○ A ball in play strikes any permanent object before bouncing on the court.

Jersey Pickleball reserves the right to modify any rules as deemed necessary. Teams are subject to disqualification for inappropriate behaviour. All players participating in any Jersey Pickleball leagues or tournaments do so at their own risk. Jersey Pickleball will not be responsible for any accidents or injuries that occur.
